In my work I address issues of Russian Modernist and Avant-garde movements in prose, poetry, and the arts with an emphasis on aesthetics, ideology, art, and politics. As part of my ongoing dissertation work, I am currently formulating a theory of "Russian Surrealism," involving the unacknowledged intellectual history of Surrealist ideas in Russia, as well as the basic formal qualities of avant-garde and experimental literature of the early 20th century that can be called "Surrealist." I am also interested in the psychology of (national/natural) space in Russian literature, Metaphysical Realism, affect theory, and theological/occult literature in Eastern Europe.
