Knowledge of Foreign Languages

Russian (reading, listening, writing, speaking): Russian was the primary focus of coursework at the Ph.D. level in the Russian literary language and in language acquisition and linguistics at the M.A. level with successful passage of language examinations (written and speaking). This experience is also based on six in-country stays in Russia and Kazakhstan totaling seventeen months.

French (reading, listening, writing, speaking): My study of French took place over five years of pre-college study and three years of an undergraduate curriculum with a focus on French literature. My in-country experience includes five stays in France or Morocco, totaling eight weeks. A published translation from the French is available in *Travels from Dostoevsky's Siberia*.
